For Kids, By Kids Pinwheels

Ingredients

The Gunpowder Plot

It all began in London in 1603. A group of English Catholics devised a plot to blow up the Houses of Parliament during the State Opening of Parliament on 5 November 1605.

The gang, which included a former soldier named Guy Fawkes, wanted to kill King James I and Members of Parliament for refusing to grant greater religious tolerance to Catholics. They hoped their plot would enable the return of Catholic rule to England (the country broke from the Catholic church in 1534). As early as May 1605, the gang hid dozens of barrels of gunpowder weighing around 1.5 tons (1,400 kg), under coal and firewood in a vault beneath the Houses of Parliament.

The plot goes wrong

The plan failed when the conspirators were betrayed. An anonymous letter revealing the plot was sent to a Lord. The vault was searched and the explosives found.

Guy Fawkes was seen at the site and arrested the evening before the planned attack. He was tortured at the Tower of London and confessed to the plot. Fawkes was tried with the other surviving conspirators on 27 January 1606, and executed four days later.

Marking the event

On 5 November 1605, Londoners were encouraged to celebrate the thwarting of the plot to kill the King by lighting bonfires. Parliament declared the date a national day of thanksgiving, and the first official celebration of it took place in 1606.

Today, Guy Fawkes Night is also known as Guy Fawkes Day, Bonfire Night and Fireworks Night. It is celebrated in the UK and in a number of countries that were formerly part of the British Empire. There are parades, bonfires, food (including toffee apples and hot dogs) and, of course, fireworks. Effigies of Fawkes, often made of straw or newspaper and dressed in old clothes, are burnt on the bonfire.

Remember, remember!

Big firework displays are organised up and down the country, many of them on 5 November itself, but some before and after. There are loads of public events that usually charge an entry fee, but many people have small-scale firework displays in their garden. A rhyme about the Gunpowder Plot is often recited in the run-up to the event:

Remember, remember, the fifth of November,

Gunpowder treason and plot. We see no reason Why Gunpowder treason Should ever be forgot....



Staying COVID-safe

If you attend a public firework display, the good news is that the risk of COVID transmission is much lower outside than in. But where there are crowds and distancing is not possible, the risk is higher, so if you are unable to stand apart from crowds, use a well-fitting face mask, ideally a respirator. Respirators help protect against both COVID-19 and smoke inhalation.



Staying safe

Here are some tips for staying safe around a fireworks event:

*The Firework Code offers plenty of advice for making sure a firework display is safe. You can read the code here: <u>www.rospa.com/policy/home-</u> <u>safety/advice/fireworks-safety</u>

*If you are having a fireworks display at home, always make sure a responsible adult is in charge of the fireworks. Ask them to check local rules and restrictions on their use before buying.

*It's always advisable to have a bucket of water nearby and to put out a bonfire rather than letting it burn out. Never use flammable liquids such as lighter fluid to start a bonfire and never light the fire in high winds.

*Some pets – especially dogs – get very upset by the loud bangs of fireworks. It's important to give them somewhere safe to hide indoors when fireworks are set off. Close windows and curtains and put on music to mask the sound of the fireworks.

There is a fall Jewish holiday, with one of the COVID-safe pillars built right in. The holiday is called Sukkot (pronounced soo-**kowt)**. It's a joyous holiday that comes each year somewhere between mid-September and mid-October, and it lasts a week.

What is a Sukkah?

For Sukkot, we build a sukkah (pronounced **su**-kuh), a temporary dwelling, where we eat, have guests over, play games, work, and sometimes even sleep (if it's warm enough and it's not raining.)

How Do You Build One?

The walls are usually made of cloth (like old sheets) or tarps held up on metal, wood or PVC poles and the roof is made of branches, which let in air, sunshine, and rain. So, every meal is a picnic, outside!

Some Sukkot (plural of Sukkah as well as the name of the holiday) are very big and can hold lots of people, or they hold fewer people who are keeping their COVID-safe outdoor distance for a meal or a game of Scrabble or Bananagrams, or your favorite game.





What is the Meaning Behind this Holiday Tradition?

SUKKO

Why would we have such a holiday when the weather is getting colder and rainier (for most of us) and the days shorter? What do you think? Part of the lesson of the holiday of Sukkot is to teach us about how fragile we are, how temporary (fleeing, transitory) can be things we think are permanent (like a dwelling, or our health), and to be thankful for the gifts of our home, health, food, family and friends.



COVID Safety Pillar: Air Quality

Sukkot are outside, in the fresh air. What other precautions could you use in a sukkah to be even safer? How could you design a sukkah to have even better airflow?

Examples of Additional COVID Safety Pillars:

Masks: Having those outside your household wearing masks when together.

Tests: Taking two COVID apart, prior to meeting.

Social Distance: Vaccination: Spacing out, tests, 48 hours especially while eating or unmasked.

Getting an updated vaccine or booster.

Please tell us about how you learn! Here is an example from England:

James & Matthew are 14 year old twins who attend a school in England. The school has been recently judged as "Outstanding" by the agency that inspects English schools. James and Matthew are not so sure!



The school has an "ethos" that is called "knowledge rich". This means that they do lots of boring memory tests all the time, and don't encourage students to learn for fun.

The twins used to learn at home and did a lot of project work and public speaking. They think their school should do this – they don't really do any.

There are no fun posters on the wall, and student work is not displayed. However, the teachers are really committed and hardworking, and good at inspiring students.

Matthew and his friends are really interested in History, and their History teacher is really good at getting the class to work hard. But Matthew is concerned that some of the things the teacher says suggest he thinks the British Empire was a good thing!


> An empire is a type of political unit in which one country controls lands beyond its borders and imposes its rule on different peoples.

James and Matthew are both very interested in politics and think that students should have lessons about this in school.

Behaviour at the school could be better. The last Principal had some funny ideas about improving behaviour, such as removing all the mirrors from the toilets (aka restrooms)!



James & Matthew both wear masks in school. They are the only ones in their classes.



James thinks all schools should teach Philosophy because you get to have deeper discussions, and learn about other people's beliefs and opinions. Students can discuss subjects like religion and politics in a very different way to how they are taught in subjects such as PSHE (Personal, Social, Health, Economic).

Several of their friends are LGBTQ+ and schools in England are generally VERY supportive of this, including hiring staff who are transgender. James & Matthew think their school is broadly supportive of trans students, but could be even better. James is the top student in his year group for Philosophy and Geography. Matthew is the top student for Spanish.







James & Matthew both represented their school in a national "Poetry by Heart" competition.



Their Mum makes decorated cakes for weddings & birthdays and she made this to say "Thank you and Good luck!" at the end of the year. It isn't common to give leaving presents like this in the UK, but students might write a card, or parents might write a "Thank you" email or letter.





SOME ANIMALS WEAR "MASKS"?

Have you ever noticed animals like meerkats, sloths, raccoons, and even some monkeys have "masks" around their eyes? These are <u>adaptations</u>, or changes that help living things survive under new conditions.



The dark fur around this meerkat's eyes protects their vision from the glare of the sun. For meerkats, this helps them better spot eagles and other raptors who may try to dive down from the sky to eat them! By spotting them early, they can warn their friends and seek shelter in their burrows.

H5N1 outbreak in USA grows

There are growing concerns among scientists about the number of human cases of H5/H5N1 bird flu in California, USA.

As *Kids' Zone* went to press, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) said there were six new confirmed and five possible human cases of bird flu in California, all of them in dairy farm workers who appeared to catch the virus directly from cows.

According to the California Department of Public Health (CDPH), all the individuals experienced "mild symptoms" including eye redness or discharge (conjunctivitis), but none went to hospital.

As of 19 October, there were a total of 27 people infected by H5 bird flu in the USA this year. Of those, 16 were H5N1, the strain that was first identified in 1996 but that mutated and, since 2021, has caused the biggest ever global outbreak in birds and mammals. It was first reported in US cattle earlier this year.

There is no evidence as yet that H5N1 can transmit easily from human to human, but there are concerns that the more it transmits from animals (birds and mammals) to humans, the more likely it is to adapt into a more dangerous virus for people.

Dairy herds in 14 US states have been found to contain cases of bird flu. In California alone, the number rose from 56 herds to 100 in just a week. Dairy and poultry farm workers are encouraged to use personal protective equipment (PPE), including face masks, to reduce the risk of catching bird flu.

As the outbreak in poultry and cattle continues, the World Health Network advises that consumers do not consume raw farm products, including unpasteurized milk, undercooked (runny) eggs, or undercooked meat – including both beef and chicken.

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Mission to find alien life blasts off!



A spacecraft that will look for evidence of alien life has blasted off from Cape Canaveral in Florida, USA.

NASA's Europa Clipper is heading to one of Jupiter's moons to see if there's an ocean trapped under the frozen surface.

It is the largest ship ever built to visit another planet and the first NASA spacecraft dedicated to studying an ocean world beyond Earth. It's thought there could be twice as much water on Europa as there is on Earth. Scientists think that if there's water, there's a good chance there will be life of some sort.

But don't expect any signs of life any time soon... the spacecraft will only arrive at Europa in 2030! It will travel an incredible 1.8 billion miles (2.9 billion km) to reach its destination. Clipper will use the momentum of Earth and Mars' gravitational pull to help propel it all the way to Europa.

Scientists first thought Europa might contain life way back in the 1970s when ice was spotted there through a telescope in Tucson, Arizona, USA. More recently, the powerful Hubble Space Telescope has taken pictures of what are thought to plumes of water, shooting 100 miles (160 km) above Europa's surface.

Clipper will fly past Europa nearly 50 times as low as 16 miles (25 km) above the surface. It will gather vital data and images that will be analysed by experts back on Earth. Scientists are on the lookout for the all-important signs that life might exist on the moon: liquid water, a heat source, and organic material.

JedX FFP3 5141 Mask Unvalved (thefacemaskstore.co.uk) I was a little bit worried because it didn't really seal very well on my nose. I felt that the nose clip would not stay in place. I might have to use double-sided tape next time perhaps?

Air Quality Monitoring

I also forgot my CO2 monitor! Interestingly, when I have brought it, I noticed that the CO2 levels are actually surprisingly good, despite the fact that windows don't open. Which I think suggests there is good mechanical ventilation probably?



Supplemental Air Purifiers

I didn't take my small air purifier with me. I usually put it at full speed and it's so loud! I just couldn't face having that too and making so much noise in the quiet room!

During the meeting I noticed some mechanical noise, maybe from laptops, which made me feel better actually. Maybe next time I'll bring it and I'll put it in lower settings.

A JOURNEY OF KINDNESS, CARE, AND CUTENESS

THE DUCK ROAD

When faced with a troubling pandemic, we decided to keep our spirits up by starting a unique COVIDconscious hobby: raising backyard ducks. Little did we know how much we would learn from them along the way!

The Dao of the Duck





According to the East Asian philosophy of Daosim (also Taoism), the "way" of the universe cannot be grasped as a concept. Rather, it must be gleaned through the actual living experience of one's everyday being. Sometimes the Dao is described as "effortless action", or as like water: easily flowing over and around obstacles.

When we watch our backyard ducks at peace, floating, and fluffing, dabbling and digging, stomping their webbed feet in puddles to scare bugs up to the surface, and then slurping up what we can only imagine tastes to them like gummy worms, we think... now that is the Dao. They seem to be both working but also so joyful and at ease.

Our backyard ducks are Pekin ducks. They are yellow as chicks and all white as adults. They do not fly, so it is easy to keep them in our fenced-in backyard. Some places have rules about keeping ducks, so it is good to know your area's rules if you decide to keep them.

Duck Stewardship

Sometimes we call the ducks our "Pandemic ducks", since we got them as baby chicks in April 2020. We don't consider ourselves to be "owners" or them to be "pets" or "livestock", but more we see ourselves as "duck stewards", and them as "fellows".

Stewardship is defined as the job of supervising or taking care of something. For instance, we provide them with a safe environment in our backyard, complete with small pools of water, space to forage, and an enclosure to protect them from predators at night. We also separate them as needed into small groups that fit with their natures and preferences, to prevent fights or disharmony. We supplement their natural foraging with extra food to make sure their nutritional needs are met.





Although they sometimes provide us eggs for eating, we also allow them opportunities to hatch their eggs if they choose.

One of our ducks, Starflight, hatched a baby last year! We named him Flink. He grew really fast from a small yellow duckling following his mother everywhere, to a light yellow fuzz exploring everything, to a handsome white drake. Now he lives on his own side of the yard with two other female ducks, named Mango and Ripples. Pekins do best with one male and at least two females in each group, so ours are separated into 3 groups of 3.

A Note on Bird Flu

This past year the <u>CDC</u> and the <u>WHN</u>, have informed the public about **avian influenza**, also called bird flu. They said that anyone with backyard poultry should wear respirator masks like N95s, and take other <u>precautions</u> too because it can spread to humans and other mammals, like cats and dogs who contact birds, and then can spread to humans they contact.

Now we wear our <u>respirator masks</u> and <u>protective eyewear</u> when we go into the duckyard, and take extra care not to touch our eyes, noses, or mouths at all. We wear <u>waterproof</u> <u>boots</u> that we keep in a special bin and do not wear them in the house or other places. We change clothes when we come inside, and wash our hands really well, and shower if we have done work out there. More info for Backyard Flock Owners <u>here</u>.
